

Bjørnholt gård

Bjørnholt was probably cleared in the early Christian Middle Ages, but may also be from late Viking era. The farm was closed in the late Middle Ages and from 1593 it had its own user.

From the early 18th century, the farm has had homesteaders. In 1736 the homestead Bjørnholthagan is mentioned and the homestead Bakken was also used before the 1750s. In the 1850s, the homestead Norddal was added. How long Bjørnholthagan was in operation is uncertain, but both the last two were closed down at or just after the turn of the century 1900.

Part of the farmhouse at Bjørnholt, a living room and kitchen, is very old. The farmhouse was rebuilt in the 1870s and in 1893 the 2nd floor was added. The boys' room is from 1889, while the barn with cowshed and stable is from 1929.

Since 1954, the following changes have taken place in the buildings: In 1976, the barn burned down and it was rebuilt as it appears today. In addition, in 2003 and 2005, two large operating barns were built for meat production of cattle.

Area and livestock in 1954: 250 daa, of which half are fields and half meadows. 110 daa of clearing and grazing as well as 420 daa of forest. The farm had three horses, 17 cows, 10 young cattle and 1 pig.

Area and livestock in 2021: The area in 2022 is 420 acres of infield and 420 acres of forest.

Of domestic animals, there are approx. 50 suckler cows and approx. 200 cattle for meat production.

The farm has been owned by the family since 1875
